### CHURCH COUNCIL NOTES - April 8, 2008

In an effort to keep the congregation better informed as to actions taken or being considered by the Church Council, we will be including a summary of significant actions in the monthly CrossWays.

**Refugee Resettlement Update:** Jen Wurst shared the progress of the Abtans self sufficiency plan. They are working on transportation, babysitters for Mutaz while his parents attend classes, keeping a calendar, clarifying medical benefits and future housing.

**Vision Task Force:** the Rev. Bryn Smallwood-Garcia updated Church Council on the group's accomplishments to date. They will share their ideas at the annual meeting.

**Fair Funds Requests:** \$375 request from Fellowship for coffee carafes, \$650 from CE for a computer for the "Heavenly Web" computer lab, \$100 for the children's library, \$500 for the Reach Booth to allow the completion of the upgrade project. These Council recommendations will be presented at the annual meeting.

**Anniversary Campaign – Projects Implementation update:** Dave Goral reported that we have \$220,000 on hand; of which \$120,000 is non-committed and \$13,000 is held in reserve, for a sum of \$110,000 in available funds. Note: the Parsonage Committee met with the Historic District Commission and is working on seven issues as they try to maintain an authentic, historic home while working with modern materials.

**Church House** – planning a work day for May 17<sup>th</sup>. Also, they reported that they have received another quote for the front of the Meetinghouse walk and steps. More details will be presented at the annual meeting.

**Stephen Ministry** – are presenting a continuing education opportunity – please join them on April 28<sup>th</sup> at 7:00pm as guest speaker, Arthur Weinshank from Cramer & Anderson speaks about wills, legacies, etc.

**Fellowship** – is looking for guidance on how to build up the Serendippers program. The committee will place an article in CrossWays explaining who they are and that everyone is invited to join their gatherings!

**2008 Yankee Fair** – please see Jeanine Hanewicz if you would consider becoming a Fair Chair. Jeanine has already accomplished many to-do items!

**Church in Society** – please join them on May 4<sup>th</sup> as they put together baby kit items for Church World Services in honor of Jen and Ryan Whipple.

**Spring Fling** – to be held May 9<sup>th</sup> at the Fox Hill Inn. Please see members of the Fellowship Committee for tickets.

**Worship** – The Rev. Davida Foy Crabtree, our Connecticut Conference Minister will preach at the 8:45 and 10:45 services on April 20th, and also meet members at the in-between time.

#### **Worship Time Change Discussion**

Church Council has been discussing the possibility of keeping our usual summer worship times — which change to 8:00am and 10:00am on June 1 through September 7 (Labor Day weekend) — all year-round. We want to know what you think. We would love for you to join us at one or both of the following "in between" opportunities to discuss the "pros" and "concerns" of this possible change, as well as to share your thoughts.

#### In-Between Opportunities: Sunday, May 11<sup>th</sup> at 9:45am Sunday, June 8<sup>th</sup> at 9:00am

Some of the "pros" & "cons" already identified have been:

- Eliminate the confusion, especially of visitors, about WHEN worship is, when congregational meetings or special events after 11:45am keep requiring us to move worship earlier
  — so we're out of the building for Danbury Chinese Alliance Church's program (12:30-4:30pm).
- Allow not only for "In-Between" adult Ed forums but "after church" classes and children & youth programs.
- Have fellowship end before the noon hour, and before people need to get to other Sunday events, such as sports events and lunches.

## **Stephen Ministers: The After People**



Frequently friends will ask, "I know you're involved in Stephen Ministry. Can you tell me exactly what a Stephen Minister is?" I like to explain that Stephen Ministers are "After People."

#### Stephen Ministers are there:

- \* After you've washed and returned the last casserole dish.
- \* After the divorce papers have been served and the bottom falls out of your life.
- \* After the last child honks the horn, waves and drives away—and the house suddenly seems incredibly empty.
- \* After you arrive home following the funeral service and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you.
- \* After the relationship has ended, but the wounds are still bleeding and painful.
- \* After the doctors have said, "There's nothing more we can do."
- \* After the door has slammed shut—for the very last time.
- After the phone call you'd always hoped you'd never get.
- \* After you realize the hands on the gold watch you received at your retirement party move more slowly than you ever imagined.
- \* After the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."
- \* After the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on and your loved one is led away.
- \* After the baby has arrived, putting more demands on you than you ever dreamed possible.
- \* After you find the pink slip inserted with what is now your final paycheck.
- \* After your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the "After People." We are ready to come alongside you—or your friends, neighbors, co-workers, or relatives—and provide comfort and support for as long "after" as we are needed.

#### Refugee Resettlement Update

It has been almost 6 months since we received the blessings of the Abtans arrival. The goal of the Refugee Resettle ministry was to get the Abtans to become self-sufficient within their first 6 months. This goal has been set by the sponsorship organization Intergrated Refugee and Immigrant Services, IRIS. The Abtans also signed an agreement with the government (an early self-sufficiency grant program) stating that they would take the appropriate measures to reach this goal and which they received a stipend to help assist in the successful accomplishment of this goal.

Self- sufficiency means that they are financially able to provide for their family and they know and understand how to arrange and get to/from their daily activities that includes work, food shopping, banking, ESL classes, literacy volunteers, laundry, babysitting etc..

The biggest step towards this is obviously being able to provide their own transportation. Nafie did receive his driver's license but he needed a job in order to afford a car. He got a job mid-March - so now it was time to go car shopping. And just when we were about to do that, we received a donation of a car from the parents of Monica McIlnerny. As of this Friday, April 25, the Abtans now own their first car here in the US – a 1998 Oldsmobile.

So let's review each committee's goals and progress:

**Clothing/household furnishings** – goal: determine refugees sizes and clothing needs, circulate a "needs list" for clothing and household goods, arrange to recycle unwanted donated items. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by mid-December.

**Acculturation/hospitality** – goal: research refugee's areas of interest and help to fulfill those needs, research churches of refugee affiliation, help the refugee in becoming oriented in the community, show how to shop, use public transportation, use emergency telephone numbers, understand local customs and laws. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by December.

**Health** – goal: apply for Medicaid, food stamps, Women/Infant/Child program for Mutaz, schedule and accompany refugees for health screening, arrange to have medical and dental needs of family met. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by January

**Education** – goal: arrange ESL classes through adult education or church volunteers, tutor the refugee in the English language. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by January – ESL classes continue through Mid-May then again in September. Help refugee be able to take driver's license test. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by March 1. The committee felt that Nafie needed to improve his computer skills. We were fortunate to have a volunteer from the Senior Center, Jack Scully, donate his time to work with Nafie one-on-one with teaching him about the basics of Microsoft Office (a 6 week course). Jack started working with Nafie on April 4, they meet every Friday from 10:00 a.m. – 12:00 noon until May 16th. Suhair is also interested in learning the computer so Nafie shares with her what Jack has taught him.

**Employment** - goal: research employment opportunities prior to refugees' arrival, help refugee find a job, enroll refugee in training programs or on-the-job training. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by March 19th. Nafie is working at Stew Leonards in the meat department. However, given his medical background, several committee members continue to help Nafie apply for entry level healthcare jobs.

#### Refugee Resettlement Update continued

**Transportation** – goal: drive the refugee to doctor appointments., ESL classes, literacy volunteers, food shopping, laundromat, place of employment. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by May 13. During the 6 months, there wasn't any transportation request that hasn't been filled.

**Finance** – goal: teach refugees about budgeting - debit vs. credit, how to write a check and manage their own bank accounts, develop a budget plan that includes re-paying the travel loan extended to provide transportation to this country. <u>Goal accomplished</u> by April. Provide ongoing oversight of church expenditures. Robin Murphy, finance chair, has developed a financial plan for the Abtans. They need to pay 100% of the utility bills that will get paid directly to the providers. They will also start paying "rent" beginning – which will be saved for 1<sup>st</sup>/last months rent + security deposit towards their future home.

Nafie is working at Stew Leonards in the meat department but given how costly it is to live in this area, it will be difficult for the Abtans to meet the financial objectives without a second job. Given his medical background, we are hoping for a second job within a healthcare setting.

#### Other

On April 18<sup>th</sup>, Nafie and Suhair were reunited with friends that they had met while staying in a refugee facility in Jordan. The Alkabasis family (mother, father and 3 children ages 7, 5 and 1) are working through the International Institute in Bridgeport, for their resettlement. They are currently residing in a lovely 2 bedroom condo in Danbury.

Suhair is volunteering at the Mosque in Danbury. She teaches Arabic to children every Sunday from 10:00 a.m. -1:00 p.m. She is very excited about this opportunity.

Wow, looking at all that has been accomplished over the past 6 months it's pretty amazing that we were able to do so much in such a short period of time. Kudos to all the committee members ....these goals could not have been accomplished without your generosity and care that you have given to the Abtan family!

#### Let's talk about race. . .

On Sunday, May 18<sup>th</sup>, I will join many pastors across our 1.2 million member church, The United Church of Christ, in accepting the call from our national offices to offer sermons and open up congregational discussion on the volatile subject of race. This call was issued, largely in response to the media's repeated airings of sermon excerpts from UCC pastor The Rev. Jeremiah Wright, which have so offended many of us who deeply love our country.

The UCC ad that ran April 11<sup>th</sup> in USA Today, stated that this invitation comes "in hopes of beginning a sacred conversation, a dialogue that our church leaders believe is needed in our pews, our homes, and the hallways of power across our country. Sacred conversations are never easy, especially when honest talk confronts our nation's painful past and speaks directly to the injustices of the present day. Yet sacred conversations can, and often do, honor the value of diverse life experiences, requiring an openness to hear each others' viewpoints."

My sermon, titled "GETTING IT TOGETHER," will view the topic of race through our lectionary texts for May 18<sup>th</sup>, Genesis 1:1-2:4a and Matthew 28:16-20. I will also guide an "In-Between" time – in Fellowship Hall, 9:45-10:35am – where we can honestly and prayerfully share our own experiences and listen respectfully to the opinions of our brothers and sisters in Christ. God Is Still Speaking,

My Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace and peace to you from a very messy office preparing for a period of vacancy as the new Whipple addition arrives. My hope is that whether we are all together or whether we are out on our own in the world somewhere that we will remember the lessons we have learned together from those who have gone before, from our time in this community, and that we will be the Body of Christ in the world.

I write to you as a little person kicks around inside of me. I often wonder whether he/she knows what it is that I am writing or thinking and gives a kick to either agree or disagree. My hope is that it is the former. The Whiplet (as we have affectionately taken to calling our new addition) will be just as blessed as I am to get to know all of you in this community, to see the way that you put your faith into action and care for one another. I thank all of you for your support as Ryan and I have prepared to bring this little person into our lives.

Many of you have asked whether or not I will come back after the Whiplet arrives.
